Missions Committee

Watch for back-to-school specials! For the months of July and August, the mission committee will be collecting school supplies for elementary school children. Any donations of backpacks, pencils, crayons, or other needed items may be placed on the table in the mission corner to be delivered before the start of school. Peggy Donaldson says that the Volunteers of America Thrift Store, 5204 Bay Rd, serving families, veterans, seniors, is having a backpack sale for back-to-school, with nice, brand new backpacks very cheap. They also have clothes &

many more items, so a good place to keep in mind for all our item donation collections. Thanks, Peggy!

Many thanks to all who so generously contributed to the April mission project of the Presbyterian Giving Catalog!! Through your incredible generosity (\$2,445.61!!), we will be able to provide a garden well, 5 Mzuzu drills (to drill wells up to 60' deep), 2 rainwater catchment systems, 8 jerry can packs (depending on local prices,8-80 cans!!), & to round out the amount, 2 sets of farming tools! These gifts will make a tremendous difference for many families & possibly several villages.

The Saginaw Caring Closet has been approved by the Mission Committee to be added to our list of charitable organizations. The Closet is a non-profit 501(c)3 organization started in 2013 as a joint venture between the Community Christian Reformed Church and Growing Years Christian Care Center. Its mission is to share the love of God by giving away free clothing, food, household items and



a free lunch to people in need. They are located on the corner of Kochville and Mackinaw (a mile north of the Covenant Hospital facility on Tittabawasee). They are open the first and third Saturdays of each month. With grants from many community organizations, they built a large pole barn, and later a garden with raised vegetable gardens. In the spring of 2024, the church closed and deeded the property and all its buildings to the Caring Closet. In 2024, they served 11,105 people and gave away 79,233 food items and 62,944 items of clothing. It is completely staffed with volunteers.
